What inspires you within the Animation culture/community





Triptych moodboard-





Lion Rock is Hong Kong's most iconic peak, a symbol of grit and resilience.

'Lion Rock Spirit' is said to be the core values that is inherited by Hong Kong
people from generation to generation. Despite the poor living standard of
Hong Kong people, rapid economic development and expansion took place

in the 1970s. This is attributed to the surge in labour force where everyone rode through ups and downs together to build a secure and prosperous future together. Everyone held each other up amongst the most difficult times. . I depicted the mountain as the 'forgotten object' in this triptych as a metaphor for the idea of pessimism and nostalgia from my observations this summer, as if Hong Kong citizens have forgotten our core values.

This sentimental piece of Lion Rock portrays how life in Hong Kong has been impacted as a result of China's national security law. From interactions with the locals and observations around the city, I have felt a strong sense of resentment towards the government and hopelessness towards our city's future.

The first image captures the way that some people are nostalgic for the golden age of Hong Kong. The 1980s and 1990s in Hong Kong were a time of prosperity, democratic reform and global interest in its culture: Bruce Lee's kung fu movies or the works of film directors such as John Woo and Wong Kar-wai. Since the establishment of NSL, many feel as though the government has taken away its semi-autonomous status, freedoms and changed Hong Kong's way of life.

The second image reflects recent or present state of the city. It is a very overwhelming time, many pro-democracy activists feel fearful under the new law, fleeing the country. The ones in support of the Chinese Communist Party however are celebrating as time gets closer to the hand over to China. I wanted to use the idea of juxtaposition here to underly the feeling of paranoia and anxiety amongst most pro-democracy Hong Kongers. The

huge shadows look as if there are big clouds covering the hills yet the sky is very clear. Many are pessimistic and already preparing for the worst hence fleeing their homes immediately.

The third image conveys the loss of hope many are feeling towards Hong Kong's future. Struggling with post-covid economy, adjusting to life after the establishment of the new law, contemplating the choices of moving countries to escape China's laws. It feels like a very lonely time and hostile environment for many protesters over the past two years, completely powerless against China's new law.
